Throughout the year, the Mangere College Under 15B rugby team have made consistent improvements in their understanding of the game and respective skill sets. The community in Mangere East are celebrating the new Local Alcohol Policy (LAP), which promises to help efforts to curb the harm from alcohol. The Mangere East Town Centre is a priority area in the LAP, so no new liquor licenses will be issued there for the next two years.

Manukau Ward Councillor Alf Filipaina and the Mangere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board also expressed their approval of the decision.

Filipaina said, "This is a big win for South Auckland." The two-year freeze on licenses will be a great step forward. The LAP is about protecting the community from harm, tackling unfair sales practices, and supporting local decisionmaking and mental health. The policy was first developed in 2013 but has been tied up

in the courts for almost an entire decade because of all the objections from businesses that sell liquor, including the major supermarket chains.

The policy has been designed in partnership with residents, community groups and local boards, as well as stakeholders representing businesses and public health organisations. It has been through a full public consultation process, with opportunities to make submissions.

The LAP will mean that applications for new bottle shops in the town centres are banned and applications in the wider Mangere East area are very likely to be rejected. Overall, the LAP will bring about a healthier, safer community in Mangere East by curbing excessive alcohol consumption and mitigating its impacts.

#### **ENROLMENTS FOR 2025**



The Board of Trustees invites applications for enrolment for all new students wishing to attend Mangere East Primary School in 2025. Parents of students who live within the home zone should also apply by this date to assist the school to plan appropriately for next year. The Enrolment Form is on our school website (www.meps.school.nz). Students who live in the home zone are entitled to enrol at the school.

Enrolment at the school is governed by an Enrolment Scheme, which is available from the school office or website. The deadline for applications for out-of-zone places is 3pm, Wednesday 10th October 2024.

The Board has determined that there will be approximately the following places available for out-of-zone students next year:

Te Poho o Rāwhiti (Māori) - Years 1&2 = 7 spaces, Year 3&4 - 3 spaces, Y5&6 - 1 space O Lou Ala i Mālō (Samoan) - Year 1 = 14 spaces, Y2-6 - 6 spaces, Y7&8 - 1 space Kafa Taha (Tongan) = Year 1 = 15 spaces, Year 2 - 5 spaces.
Cook Islands Māori = Year 1 = 15 spaces, Years 2-3 - 4 spaces.
Kahu (English-Medium) - Years 7-8 = 0 spaces
English-Medium - Years 1-6 = 0 spaces

The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone. If the number of out-of-zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. If a ballot is required it will be held on Wednesday 17th October 2024. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.

This continues to be a highlight in our academic calendar, providing young mathematicians with a platform to showcase their

this inspiring and awesome learning opportunity. A number of schools from South Auckland competed against each other at three different events before the culmination of the final event of the Junior South

This exhilarating event saw Year 7 and 8 students from various schools compete in a fast-paced numerical race, with each team of four students collaborating to solve 15 challenging Maths guestions within a 20-minute countdown. achievement for the Mangere Central School Mathex team, who had already demonstrated their mathematical prowess by securing first place in the Year 7 category and third place in the Year 8 category at event 3 of the Junior South Auckland Mathematics Challenge at De La Salle College just two weeks prior to this final event. The triumphant Mathex team beamed with excitement, iov, and satisfaction as they celebrated their hard-earned victory. Our learning journey at the Mathex competition this year progressed through the stages of "lift" and "rise" before soaring to the heights of "success". The team's vision for 2024 had come to fruition, and their success was a testament to their dedication and teamwork.
