The Pacific dance theatre production, Manamea, by Sau E Siva Creatives has just completed a sold-out second season of this much-celebrated love story at the Māngere Arts Centre.

Founder of the show and Sau E Siva Creative Director Troy Tu'ua says this production has been particularly special, given "the whole point of creating this story was for our people here [in Māngere]".

"When you go to the city, you worry about car parking and expensive tickets, so we said, 'we've got to bring it back home'.

"And we got some beautiful support from the Mangere-

Ōtāhuhu Local Board, as well as the Ministry for Pacific Peoples and the Māngere Arts Centre. "So we were just really grateful and everything just fell into place."

He adds that seeing how both young and old enjoyed it shows their hard work was worth it. "Seeing our elders come here and honour our type of storytelling and get up and be proud, whether they come in wheelchairs or walking sticks, they were up and dancing, "If this is how our people are reacting and responding to our work, then we've got to continue on because if we don't do it, who's going to do it?" Fellow Sau E Siva Creative Leki

Jackson-Bourke agrees.

"It's really rewarding to see our community come to the theatre. It's awesome to see them believe in our work and in our stories and value it.

"And a lot of these performers are inexperienced and untrained, but they're so talented. They're literally from the streets or straight from school.

"And we've brought them into this program that we run, Sau e Siva."

Siana Vagana played the leading role of Palepa Junior in the show. She says playing such an important part had extra significance.

"It felt like an honour, especially with it being their 10 year

anniversary show so I felt a lot of pressure but I just really wanted to give the role justice and make sure the story is the best for our audiences and stuff."

Tu'ua says while theatre might not be for everyone, it's making a real impact.

"We've got 40-something in here, living their best lives on stage, singing and dancing their hearts out. So I'm grateful for our Sau E Siva team to create this type of platform for our people to keep thriving in. But yeah, we just need more support, more moola."

FIRST PACIFIC FOOTBALL FERN RECOGNISED AT SPECIAL EVENT IN MANGERE



New Zealand's first Pacific women's footballer has finally received her debut cap four decades after taking the field against Australia.

Rosie Ah Wong, who began playing for the Football Ferns in 1979 and scored the Ferns' first ever goal against Australia's Matildas, was presented her cap by New Zealand Football (NZF) president Johanna Wood at Walter Massey Park in Mangere last month. Ah Wong says it came as a complete

surprise when NZF got in touch about the presentation. "It's humbling and it's also recognition of those people who have supported me along the journey. "I'm so glad that I've come back to the club to receive this honour. It makes me feel happy and it's really nice to see my old friends." Wood says the capping ceremony is part of a wider program the organisation has undertaken to

present caps to all past players who originally missed out.

"I think we've now handed out about 160 caps to past Ferns. From 2019, if you were a debutante, you got your cap at the time, which is the way it should be. So while we can't change the past, we can reconnect with our past."

Ah Wong, who lives between New Zealand and Sāmoa, says it's been special to return

to her old club in Mangere and see how much has changed.

"To see where the club is now, from that time, and how it's growing and the diversity of the ethnicities - it's wonderful to see." The presentation took place before a women's five-a-side and men's seven-a-side tournament kicked-off called Football Fest

Current club chairperson Hone Fowler says Ah Wong's recognition is an important reminder that football is a sport for Pacific communities just as it is for other ethnic groups who more visibly represented. "I think I've heard her being referred to as the Pele of the women's game of the Pacific in her time. And so she was a very special young talent, who came through as a teenager to play for the New Zealand team. And I think it just speaks to the potential that we're still tapping into of our Pacific and Māori communities."

And Fowler says he hopes Ah Wong's recognition is part of wider work to realise the potential of South Auckland's footballing talent.

"Football is a global sport and so we're trying to we're creating pathways that are more accessible, particularly for our Pasifika, our Māori communities and other minority communities here in Auckland."

Chelsea Cuthers-Munro says her first step towards cultural reconnection wasn't an easy one, but it has now led to the premiere of a heartfelt short film *The Vaka That Waited*.

A proud NZ-born Cook Islands single mother of "two beautiful children" and Niu FM Days host, released the doco last month, which is about her journey to reconnect with her culture.

But as Cuthers-Munro explains in the film, being fair looking, not being able to speak her Cook Islands language and only having cultural exposure at events like funerals or weddings made it hard for her to come to terms with her identity.

She even experienced criticism from listeners when she talked about her Cook

Island heritage on the air.

She recalls one particular incident when she produced a video on the Cook Islands' dish Mainese.

"I let my mum know I did my first Cook Islands piece so I was feeling really good about it," Cuthers-Munro says.

However some viewers began questioning her heritage, saying things like, "tell this white girl to leave our culture alone" and "whose family is she from? Embarrassing". However she now looks back on that as a turning point, given it led her towards learning the Cook Islands national anthem. "As a 27-year-old, I had never heard it before in my life," she says.

"Music is a really great tool for me to catch on to speaking and pronunciation." Cuthers-Munro says she was then asked to sing with popular Cook Islands musician Rex Atirai and from that point on she told herself: "This is a problem that I can either cry about or do something about it." She then set a goal of doing an annual Cook Islands project for each Cook Islands Language Week, with *The Vaka That Waited* being her "biggest one yet".

Her short film, which has been in the works for three years, covers Cuthers-Munro's journey towards rediscovery, reconnection and reclamation of her roots in the Cook Islands, highlighting the struggles of many who may feel disconnected from their cultural heritage.

The documentary emphasises themes of healing and empowerment with Cuthers-Munro finding solace, a renewed sense of identity and a profound feeling of belonging as she sets sail on her vaka, navigating back to her roots.

THIRTY YEARS OF PUTTING MĀNGERE EAST'S FAMILIES AT THE CENTRE



ME Family Services (ME) has marked its 30th anniversary with a community-focused celebration that acknowledged all the people who have made it such an integral part of this area.

Founder, current chairperson and former chief executive Reverend Pete Sykes says he started it partly in response to finding a baby abandoned at Walter Massey Park and realising how vulnerable some families were.

"Thirty years ago there were no support services for local schools and our families," Sykes says.

"There were no community-based early childhood centres. There were no community-based social workers. There were no groups that would speak for Mangere East as a village in its own right.

"So part of it was about supporting the school and give them some support with families who were struggling."

Sykes adds the sign of the organisation's success has been its ability to evolve and adapt to the community's needs.

"I'm really pleased that one of the tests I guess as a founder is that the team that replaced me have continued on the kaupapa and

they've made it their own place."
Current chief executive Carole TanaTepania says seeing how many families have been impacted by ME has been a special part of the 30th celebrations.
"It's been great, actually really humbling, you know, that the families that have come to join us for the day and celebrate not only our success of still being here for 30 years, but their journey and allowing us to be a part of their lives."

Early childhood centre manager Karen Matata, who's been at ME since it began, says its longevity is quite a unique achievement.

"I think about the number of services that are no longer here 30 years later. Yet how many organisations in Mangere can say that they've been going solid for 30 years and still planning for the future to be strong moving forward?"

And she adds that seeing the intergenerational impact is another thing that makes ME so special.

"I love that the children of the children [who came here] are still coming. That's a really great thing. I love the whole whanaufeel across all the teams within our center, with each other, but also with other families that we work with. You know, you work with a family and they're here for like a lifetime."

Friends of the Farm is a group of volunteers based in Māngere Bridge whose aim is to build a caring, connected and waste-wise community. They organize a wide range of free, family-orientated activities, and aim to encourage and involve people in reducing and recycling waste and raising awareness and connection within our neighbourhood.

Repair Cafe

Among Friends of the Farm's recent activities were a Repair Café at the Māngere Bridge Library and an E-waste day. Repair Cafes are a growing movement in New Zealand, and Friends of the Farm have held five in the last two years. Skilled volunteers are on hand to repair and fix broken items for free. In March, 52 items were repaired and locals were thrilled. The next Repair Café at Māngere Bridge Library will be on Saturday 13 July 2024.

E-waste day

For the E-waste day in early April, Friends of the Farm partnered with Penrose-based company Computer Recycling to run the day. Over 400 cars came through and around five tonnes of waste was collected. Computer Recycling repurposes and recycles what they can and extracts





valuable materials that is otherwise destined for landfill.

'MUCH LOVED MATRIARCH' LEAVES LEGACY OF **NURTURING HER STUDENTS AND GAGANA SĀMOA**

"E iloa oe i lau tu, i lau savali ma lau tautala"

(A person is known by the way they carry themselves, by the way they walk and by the way they speak - Sāmoan Proverb). - Fuatino Melegalenuu To'alepaiali'i Ah Sam MNZM

A pioneering Sāmoan educator and community leader is being remembered for her work at ASB Polyfest, EFKS and Mangere

Fuatino Melegalenuu To'alepaiali'i Ah Sam, MNZM (known as Mele), Acting Principal of Mangere College, died peacefully on Monday, 15th April, surrounded by her loved ones, just days short of her 76th birthday.

Prior to her senior leadership roles at Mangere College, Mele was HOD Commerce and HOD Languages. She was a pioneer in the establishment of a languages block at Mangere College in 2012, aimed at enriching Māori and Pacific learning. Mele will be remembered for her passion for teaching, her promotion of Gagana Sāmoa and her advocacy for Pacific Languages. In 2021 she was honoured as one of the first recipients of a Tautai o le Gagana Language Champion Honours Award, an initiative of the Ministry for Pacific Peoples (MPP).

In 2022 she was appointed a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) for services to Pacific Language Education. Her citation noted that she was a founding member and executive officer of Fotu o Malama, the Association for Teachers of Sāmoan Language and Culture in the

secondary and tertiary

sectors. She was also she has connected with." acknowledged for her role as lead coordinator of the Sāmoan stage at the ASB Auckland Polyfest and as a member of the organising committee and Trust Board.

Mele was also a Deacon and Treasurer of EFKS New Zealand New Vision Church.

Auckland University's Sāmoan language lecturer, former colleage and friend Lemoa Henry Fesuluai says Mele made a significant contribution to the education sector.

"Her work extends to NZQA and MoE with many contractual service roles to ensure Quality Assurance for both Internal and External exams. She helped develop resources for NCEA and NZC (New Zealand Curriculum) for Sāmoan language, which benefited generations and the development of Pacific languages."

Fesuluai says Mele's left behind an incredible legacy.

"Mele was a proud Mangere person and protected [us from] criticisms regarding Mangere,

Mangere College, South Auckland and Pacific - she would fight and ensure we were never looked down at or frowned upon. This attitude and her qualities, she passed on and shared with colleagues, friends, families and generations of all ages." "She always is present or makes an effort

to support local music, performing and creative artists, especially her past students of anv school

As Mele herself said in an interview last year, ensuring her students had the opportunity to learn their language was a key driving force in her life.

"I hope that whoever is going to listen to this interview will get the same passion that I have; one for our language, our Gagana

> Sāmoa. And then, number two, for our Gagana Sāmoa to develop and continue to flourish in this island of Aotearoa that we and our aiga have now called our home." Mele was also known to

thousands of students who performed on the Sāmoan stage at ASB Polyfest, where she'd worked as the lead coordinator since 1993. During the memorial service at Malaeola, long time friend and colleage Viv Maskell shared the passion Mele demonstrated for the students and Sāmoan language, but also mentioned the love that she showed to her



colleagues.

"Our staff are grateful to Mele for the wisdom, love and kindness she showed us. She became our much loved Matriarch, role model, mentor, builder of bridges and selfesteem. She took an interest in us and our families, celebrating events and supporting

us in times of trauma or need." PMN Cook Islands radio host and former Māngere College student Ernestina Bonsu Maro called her the "Queen of Mängere

College" and says Mele will be sorely missed by the community.

"The last event I saw her at was at the beginning of this year for our Mangere College students and I still remember the words 'I am proud of you Tina, keep serving your people'."

Several memorial events were held on Thursday 18 April, and a final service was held on Monday 22 April at EFKS Vaimoso, before burial at the nearby family cemetery.
